2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES – March 21, 2025

Approval of the minutes for the March 21, 2025, McHenry County Council of Mayors meeting. A motion was made by Mr. Leone (Harvard), which was seconded by Mr. Ganek (Algonquin). The motion was approved unanimously.

5. INFORMATION ITEMS

A. Lake-McHenry MS4 Training Program Mr. Kuykendall presented on an upcoming training that would be provided in Lake County on May 21st and invited members of the council to attend.

6. APPROVAL ITEMS

A. Election of Officers – Chair

Chair Mack expressed his willingness to continue to serve as the chair for the Council of Mayors. A motion was made by Ms. Sofiakis (Johnsburg) to elect Chair Mack for another two-year term, which was seconded by Mr. Farrell (Huntley). The motion passed unanimously.

- B. Election of Officers Vice Chair Chair Mack stated that Vice Chair Berendt was also interested in continuing to serve as the Council of Mayors' Vice Chair. Mr. Tiedt (Woodstock) moved to elect Vice Chair Berendt to another two-year term, which was seconded by Mr. Hennings (McHenry County). The motion passed unanimously.
- C. Methodology Changes Increasing the Maximum Project Award Amount to \$1,800,000

Mr. Duffin explained the nature of the proposed change from \$1,500,000 to \$1,800,000 and how it would impact the program if implemented. The proposed change would also set aside up to \$200,000 of the Council's annual mark exclusively for engineering phases. Each community could be awarded up to one project with a maximum award to a single project of \$100,000. A motion was made by Mr. Farrell (Huntley) and seconded by Mr. McMahon (Spring Grove) to increase the maximum award amount to \$1,800,000, The motion was approved unanimously.

D. Methodology Changes – Safety Category

Mr. Duffin explained the shortcomings he found in the previous safety category scoring and the reasoning for the new approach. The new methodology would utilize a beforeand-after analysis based on the USDOT Safe Systems Approach in order to determine safety scores. A motion was made by Mr. Lamz (Harvard) and seconded by Mr. McMahon (Spring Grove) to approve the proposed change. The motion was approved unanimously.

E. MCCOM Methodology for FY 2027 – FY 2031 Call for Projects

Mr. Duffin said that he was including a few minor methodology changes as part of the present item, such as using the most up-to-date road condition data at the time of scoring, changing the scoring categories for Local Needs. Additionally, he informed the Council of Mayors that any necessary unanticipated methodology changes would be brought to the council. A motion was made by Ms. Sofiakis (Johnsburg) to approve the methodology, which was seconded by Mr. Ganek (Algonquin). The motion was approved unanimously.

F. STP-L 2025-2029 Active Program

Mr. Duffin explained the changes to the STP-L program since the March meeting. A motion was made by Mr. McMahon (Spring Grove) to approve the program, which was seconded by Mr. Lamz (Harvard). The motion was approved unanimously.

7. PLANNING LIAISON REPORT

Mr. Duffin shared the contents of the circular letter with the Council of Mayors.

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Pace Suburban Bus McHenry County Council of Mayors 9/19/25

Ridership:

In April 2025 Pace caried over 2 million riders which is a 7% increase over 2024 levels. 2nd highest ridership in the last 12 months.

In May Pace's system carried over 2 Million riders which is a 4.5% increase over 2024 levels. The total this past May represented our second highest system ridership in the past year!

In June Pace's system carried approximately 2 million riders, which is a 9.1% increase over 2024 levels.

In July Pace's system carried just more than 2 million rides, which represents an increase of 5.4% over 2024

These 2025 ridership stats continue to reflect how Pace's investments in frequency and targeted system enhancements are bringing back more riders into the system.

Public Hearings held on RTA's Proposed Changes to TAP & RAP Programs

Pace held public hearings on the Regional Transportation Authority's 2025 ADA Paratransit Action Plan which proposed programmatic changes, including fare increases, for Pace's Taxi Access Program (TAP) and Rideshare Access Program (RAP).

On June 12, 2025, the Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) adopted Ordinance 2025-26 approving an ADA Paratransit Action Plan, which includes proposed changes to the ADA Paratransit program to address the projected 2025 ADA Paratransit budget shortfall. In accordance with the RTA ADA Paratransit Action Plan, the RTA proposed the following programmatic changes for implementation in 2025:

- Capping the number of TAP and RAP rides to 30 per month per rider
- Increasing the TAP and RAP fares to \$3.25
- Implementing free fixed route rides for ADA certified riders (Pace already implemented this change in 2024)

Official action by Pace and RTA is still pending at this time. The proposed changes will be considered by Pace and the Regional Transportation Authority upon review of the feedback received as part of the public hearing process. When any final decisions are made, Pace will notify all enrollees of TAP and RAP as well as publish information online.

Interested persons may obtain copies of any reports, resolutions, or certificates describing the basis upon which the fare increase was calculated by viewing RTA Ordinance 2025-26 and the RTA ADA Paratransit Action Plan available below.

New Regional Day Pass is now available regionwide

The new Regional Day Pass launched on June 20th. Transit riders throughout the region now have a new option to travel the Chicago area. The pass is a collaborative effort between Pace, Metra, CTA, and the RTA to advance fare integration and the transit rider experience.

The pass costs \$2.50 more than the usual Metra day pass and includes full access to Pace's regular fixed-route service and CTA buses and trains. Available only in the Ventra app, the new Regional Day Pass allows riders who may be visiting or just using the entire transit system for the day to travel the region using Pace, Metra, and the CTA without the need to purchase individual passes from each operator. The fare revenue difference is being funded by a pilot grant from the RTA.

Metra launches 19th annual Safety Contest

2026 Regional Transit Budget funding amounts approved

At its August meeting, the RTA Board of Directors approved the <u>2026-28 Funding Marks Ordinance</u>, establishing operating funding amounts and required recovery ratios for CTA, Meta, and Pace. The ordinance also provides each Service Board with preliminary estimates of funds available for the development of the 2026-2030 Capital Program.

With the fiscal cliff approaching and the lack of state action to provide additional operations funding, this year's funding marks process differs significantly from prior years. The proposed 2026 operating funding amounts include one-time shifts of \$75 million in limited discretionary funding to help align our services regionally and delay CTA's fiscal cliff, which is anticipated to arrive before those of Metra and Pace. This shift of funding is for 2026 only and will not affect planned service levels – all operating agencies will see their funding increase from 2025 levels. The goal behind shifting funds is to delay the impact of the fiscal cliff on transit service and provide legislators more time to address the crisis before harming riders.

These one-time steps will not structurally solve the fiscal cliff – our ask from the state does not change and we anticipate the structural funding gap to remain at around 20% of our regional operating budget.

ADA Paratransit Action Plan to address budget deficit

In 2024 Pace launched the Rideshare Access Program (RAP), expanding consumer subsidies for ADA paratransit riders to rideshare companies Uber and UZURV. The program, similar to Pace's Taxi Access Program (TAP), has since become highly popular and costs have created a significant gap in the ADA paratransit budget – in 2024 the region faced a \$25.5 million shortfall that was mitigated by a one-time disbursement of ADA paratransit reserve funds. RTA staff estimates that total 2025 ADA ridership will exceed budget producing a potential shortfall of \$35-65 million without action.

In May 2025, the RTA Board recommended an ADA Paratransit Action Plan to manage the continued growth of RAP and TAP. The Action Plan recommends immediate actions such as capping monthly rides, matching traditional ADA

Future recommendations include a fare increase for traditional ADA paratransit service, adjustments to RAP and TAP parameters, and better aligning county-based rideshare programs and RAP to standardize fares.

After a series of public hearings in July, the RTA Board at its August meeting adopted an <u>ordinance</u> approving the use a combination of the remaining balance of the RTA's ADA Paratransit Reserve, regional discretionary funds, and Pace funding to address the paratransit budget shortfall. The ordinance also directs Pace to take mitigation measures to achieve budget balance with this funding, outlined in the Action Plan.

Transit is the Answer Coalition provides feedback on funding, reform as fiscal cliff nears

More than 200 riders, advocates, and other stakeholders met virtually with the RTA on Wednesday, August 13 for the eighth quarterly Transit is the Answer Coalition meeting and discussed the 2026 budget process, how peer regions are addressing their fiscal cliffs, and House Bill 3438, the funding and reform bill that passed the Illinois Senate during the General Assembly's spring legislative session but was not called for a vote in the House. RTA to award more than \$16M for mobility projects

At its August meeting, the RTA Board approved a program of projects that will make it easier for older adults and people with disabilities to get to jobs, medical appointments, the grocery store, social activities, and more. The Section 5310
Program is a federal formula grant program that provides assistance to public transportation projects that focus on enhancing mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities. Projects serving the MCCOM membership area include:

- McHenry County | McHenry County Transportation Programs | \$1,995,000 in federal funds with \$1,905,000 local matching funds.
- RTA | Regional Dial-a-Ride Coordination Study | \$350,000 in federal funds.

RTA staff will now prepare the official application to the Federal Transit Administration and will issue grant agreements to subrecipients in the first and second quarters of 2026. More information and a full list of selected projects can be found on the RTA Connections blog.

Illinois Tollway Update

Capital Plan – Investing in the Future

The Illinois Tollway is continuing to advance its planning process for the next major capital plan that will shape the framework for the agency's long-term capital priorities.

The Tollway established a Stakeholder Advisory Team to assist with defining program goals and providing regional input for the next capital plan, as well as a Strategic Planning Committee, a Board-level committee overseeing the agency's strategic and capital planning process with a goal of delivering plans in 2025.

The Stakeholder Advisory Team delivered its final report to the Strategic Planning Committee in December, marking a significant milestone in our planning process. This report contained the Team's value statements, priorities and a series of recommendations for the Tollway's consideration as it develops the next capital plan. This report is available on the Tollways website at www.illinoistollway.com/future.

Capital planning stakeholder outreach remains ongoing, and the Tollway looks forward to continued engagement with this organization, and we invite you to visit the Tollway's website at www.illinoistollway.com/future to learn more.

Bridging the Future

In addition to the ongoing development of the next major capital plan, the Tollway recently announced *Bridging the Future*, a \$2 billion, seven-year capital program. The program will serve as a bridge between the infrastructure investments already underway as part of the current *Move Illinois* capital program, and the needs of the agency's next major capital program.

Bridging the Future includes planning, design and construction services to address four important themes across the system:

- Connecting Infrastructure: The program will provide funding for interchange and bridge design and construction that improves interconnectivity and access to communities along the Tollway system.
- 2) **Improving Mobility**: The program will continue the Tollway's commitment to safety and mobility by supporting bridge reconstructions across the system and investing in strategic widening projects that reduce potential congestion and improve driver experience.
- 3) **Modernizing the System**: The program will ensure continued investments in system improvements and maintenance priorities by providing investments for bridge repairs, pavement rehabilitation, and funding for upgrades to Tier II plazas and Tollway facilities.
- 4) **Preparing for Tomorrow:** The program includes investments that explore the feasibility of new technologies, including allocating funds for pilot programs and studies.

Funding for the Bridging the Future capital program is not expected to require any adjustments in the Illinois Tollway's current tolling structure nor any additional debt financing beyond that already planned for the *Move Illinois* Program.

Explore the CMAP data hub

CMAP's <u>Data Hub</u> provides vetted and trustworthy information about northeastern Illinois so local governments, community organizations, academic researchers, and businesses can learn and make informed decisions about their communities. 2024 IDOT crash data

On August 11, 2025, IDOT released <u>Circular Letter 2025-11</u> announcing the availability of the 2024 crash data. This data set provides important crash information required for the identification of areas of improvement, work on safety studies, and the analysis on the location and number of crashes. The data can be accessed through IDOT's Safety Portal.

2023 IDOT National Highway System (NHS) pavement and bridge data

IDOT collects condition data on Interstate pavements annually and on non-Interstate pavements on a two-year cycle. Bridges receive a routine visual inspection at least every 2-4 years, depending on the condition. The results of the most recent NHS pavement condition assessments and bridge inspections, along with performance measures and targets, may be accessed on IDOT's "Performance" webpage.

Vulnerable Road User Safety Assessment (VRUSA)

The IDOT <u>Vulnerable Road User Safety Assessment (VRUSA)</u> is available for download and use. The VRUSA contains IDOT's efforts to help stakeholders identify programs and projects to address vulnerable road user safety through stakeholders' engagement and data analysis. It also outlines safety strategies based on the safe system approach with a profound consideration for equity principles. It is IDOT's intention for this document to be an important tool for stakeholders to continue to address the needs of VRU's in their communities.

To assist in the use of the VRUSA for the planning of future projects that address the safety of VRUs, a <u>VRUSA Dashboard</u> has been created that allows the user to view the results of the VRUSA data analysis in a way that can be filtered to specific areas of the state.

Funding opportunities

IDOT Safe Routes to School Cycle 2025

On July 11, 2025, the Illinois Department of Transportation released <u>Circular Letter 2025-10</u> detailing the notice of funding opportunity for the 2025 <u>Illinois Safe Routes to School (SRTS)</u> program. IDOT will be accepting applications for the SRTS grant beginning **August 1, 2025, through October 13, 2025**. The SRTS supports projects and programs that enable and encourage walking, rolling, and bicycling to and from school. SRTS will be 100% funded and require no local match.

To assist in your preparation of the upcoming cycle, the IDOT has partnered with Active Transportation Alliance to offer an informational webinar series. The final webinar is scheduled for **September 17** from 11 am to 1 pm. Each webinar date has a unique agenda and applicants are encouraged to register for each date. Registration, recordings, and additional information are available on the <u>SRTS website</u>.

IEPA Green Infrastructure Grant Opportunities (GIGO)

The Green Infrastructure Grant Opportunities (GIGO) program utilizes funds distributed by the State of Illinois generated under the Build Illinois Bond Fund. Illinois EPA's Notice of Funding Opportunity includes \$5,000,000 in funding for projects that will improve water quality in Illinois. GIGO has set a maximum total grant award of \$2,500,000 with a minimum grant award of \$75,000. The GIGO program funds projects to construct green infrastructure best management practices (BMPs) that prevent, eliminate, or reduce stormwater runoff into Illinois' rivers, streams, and lakes.

Eligible projects will construct BMPs to decrease stormwater runoff prior to release into rivers, streams, and lakes, and include:

- 1. Reconnection of a stream with its floodplain (e.g., two-stage ditch, daylighting);
- Treatment and flow control of stormwater runoff at sites directly upstream or downstream of an impervious area that currently impacts river, stream, or lake water quality through stormwater runoff discharge; and/or
- 3. Treatment and flow control of water generated from impervious surfaces associated with urban development (such as roads and buildings).

Applications are being accepted now through **November 5, 2025**. Full application details and more information are included in the <u>Notice of Funding Opportunity</u> through AmpliFund.

The new safety system reviews the proposed project's current conditions compared to the proposed changes. After reviewing multiple projects from the past 4 application cycles, the new proposed scoring scale is as follows:

6B. Point adjustments in the Resurfacing portion of the STP application.

In the previous application, the resurfacing scoring section has Safety scoring a maximum of 12 points, split between 3 categories. With the overhaul of the safety section, the number of points attributed to safety increased to 18 points. In order to keep the overall Resurfacing score at 100, other categories of the resurfacing application were adjusted.

Pavement conditions was reduced by 3 points, going from 25 points to 22 points. The scale remains the same, with iterations at 22, 17, 9 and 0. Creating a new alignment still scores 5 points.

The Complete streets category was reduced by 3 points, going from 15 to 12. Iterations are the same, just lower. 12 is the max score for the category, achieved by adding a complete streets element. The other score is 5, achieved by maintaining complete streets elements.

Methodology Changes for the 2027-2031

The methodology document had a few updates from the previous. For the new engineering target, the match ratio was set at 50/50. The same project cannot apply for an engineering grant and construction grant in the same cycle. Scoring changes were made to reflect what was discussed previously.

PLANNING LIAISON REPORT

7A. Socioeconomic Presentation

CMAP has completed its process analyzing the socio-economic forecast for both the region as a whole and McHenry County. The forecast estimates the number and distribution of people and jobs in northeastern Illinois to help CMAP and the region's communities plan for changing needs. They are looking to present at next Council meeting.

7B. Local Forecast Advisory Meeting

CMAP is also holding a virtual meeting on September 22nd at 1pm. At the meeting CMAP will:

- provide an overview of the regional and local forecast process
- Share the 2050 regional population and employment forecast
