6. APPROVAL ITEMS

A. Methodology Changes – Reworking the Safety Category Scoring
Mr. Kovarik explained how the Safety Category scoring was altered between resurfacing
and reconstruction projects. For reconstruction projects, scoring will now be based on
the percent change between the current roadway and the proposed project changes.
For resurfacing projects, scoring will be based on Restriping work, Signage work, and the
percent change between the current roadway and the proposed project changes A
motion was made by Mr. Lamz (Harvard) and seconded by Mr. McDillon (Lake in the
Hills) to use the newly proposed safety scoring methodology. The motion was approved,

with Mr. Farmer (Crystal Lake) abstaining.

B. Methodology Changes – Scoring Changes

Mr. Kovarik explained that changes to the safety scoring were also made to balance the resurfacing and reconstruction categories. The resurfacing category had a maximum of 12 points, split between 3 categories. With the overhaul of the safety section, the number of points attributed to safety increased to 18 points. In order to keep the overall Resurfacing score at 100, other categories of the resurfacing application were adjusted. Pavement conditions was reduced by 3 points, going from 25 points to 22 points. The scale remains the same, with iterations at 22, 17, 9 and 0. Creating a new alignment still scores 5 points. The Complete streets category was reduced by 3 points, going from 15 to 12. Iterations are the same, just lower. 12 is the max score for the category, achieved by adding a complete streets element. The other score is 5, achieved by maintaining complete streets elements. A motion was made by Mr. McMahon (Spring Grove) and seconded by Mr. Noonan (Cary) to approve the proposed change. The motion was approved unanimously.

C. MCCOM Methodology for FY 2027 – FY 2031 Call for Projects

Mr. Kovarik said that he was planning on opening the STP call for projects on October 13 and closing on December 12. No action was required.

D. STP-L 2025-2029 Active Program

Mr. Kovarik explained the changes to the STP-L program since the March meeting. A motion was made by Mr. Gruen (McHenry) to approve the program, which was seconded by Mr. McDillon (Lake in the Hills). The motion was approved unanimously.

7. PLANNING LIAISON REPORT

- A. Scheduling Socioeconomic Presentation
 - i. Mr. Kovarik reported that CMAP has completed process analyzing the socioeconomic forecast for both the region as a whole and McHenry County. They will present at the next Council meeting.
- B. Local Forecast Advisory Meeting
 - i. CMAP is holding a virtual meeting to cover their regional and local population and employment forecasts on September 22nd.
- C. CMAP State of the Region Event
 - i. Mr. Kovarik reminded the Council that CMAP's event would be held on November 4th.

Northern Illinois Transit Authority Act (SB2111) Overview

Governance

- Northern Illinois Transit Authority (NITA) is established to replace the Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) effective June 2026.
 - The NITA Board is made up of 20 Directors, with the Chair selected by the directors.
 Appointments: 5 each from Chicago Mayor, Cook County President, Governor; one each from DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry, Will Counties
 - o 17 of 20 NITA directors also serve on either CTA, Metra, or Pace service boards
 - NITA Board action:
 - 12 votes with at least 2 "yes" votes from each of the 4 appointing authorities <u>OR</u> 15 "yes" votes out of 20
 - NITA establishes ADA and Rider Advisory Councils
- Transit service board appointing authorities will change as follows:
 - CTA service board- 7 Directors: Mayor (3); Governor (2); Cook County President (2); [4ⁱ are also NITA directors]
 - Metra service board 11 Directors; Governor (1); Mayor (2); Cook County (3); one each from DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry, Will Counties [6 are also NITA Directors]
 - Pace service board 11 Directors: Governor (1); Mayor (2); Cook County (3); one each from DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry, Will [7 are also NITA Directors]

Operations

- NITA is responsible for regional transit planning, fare setting, budgeting, capital programming, marketing, major project delivery, etc.
- Service Standards and Service Plans will be created at a regional level, so transit is provided where it is most needed and supported based on regional standards
- NITA is required to deliver fare integration (by 2/1/2030), as well as fare capping and regionally integrated information for riders, i.e., schedules, connections, alerts
- NITA handles debt issuance moving forward (CTA retains bonding authority for 2 major Red Line projects)
- NITA defines job description for Service Board executive directors, participates in their selection, conducts annual evaluations, and may remove them from positions
- Collective bargaining agreements will remain with Service Boards for employee continuity
- An Office of Disability Planning and Policy will be established within NITA and a regional Transit Accessibility Plan will be developed

Safety

- NITA establishes a Law Enforcement Task Force led by Cook County Sheriff in collaboration with Chicago Police, Metra Police, Illinois State Police, and local jurisdictions
 - Report on ongoing safety strategies due to ILGA by 12/1/26
 - Within 3 years, the Law Enforcement Task Force will develop a recommended plan to transition to a sworn law enforcement crime prevention program
 - NITA will vote on enacting law enforcement crime prevention program



Safety (continued)

- Regional Transit Ambassadors program will be established by 7/1/27
- NITA establishes the NITA Board Safety Subcommittee

Transit-Supportive Development

- Parking minimums are abolished within one-half mile of transit hubs 1/8 mile of transit corridors with frequent service statewide
- NITA is allowed to participate in transit-oriented development/joint development in partnership with local jurisdictions
- Communities are enabled to partner with NITA to provide enhanced transit service

Roadway Policies to Support Transit

- The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), the Illinois State Toll Highway Authority, and counties and municipalities shall collaborate with and provide support to the NITA and other public transit providers in the implementation of bus rapid transit
- IDOT will create a Transit Integration Policy Development Committee and hire a Transit Coordination Oversight Officer to develop transit-friendly policies
- As part of performance-based programming, IDOT must evaluate projects for mode-shift away from single-occupant vehicle trips

Transition

- Effective date of NITA Act is 6/1/26
- New NITA Board and Service boards seated by 9/1/26
- IDOT contracts for transition consultant by 9/1/26
- NITA establishes a Transition Working Group with 15 members by 10/1/26
- NITA Transition Plan completed with report to ILGA by 7/1/27

Funding

- Current sales tax on motor fuels will fund transit operations (approx. \$860M per year)
 - 85% to NITA and 15% to downstate transit agencies
- 0.25% increase in current RTA regional transit sales taxⁱⁱ for NITA region operations (approx. \$450M per vear)
- Interest on State Road Fund estimated at \$200M per year to fund transit capital
 - o 90% to NITA and 10% to downstate transit agencies
- Current statutory funding formulas are abolished; after 6-year transition period, all funding will be allocated to Service Boards based on Service Standards/Service Plan
- Paratransit continues to beprioritized in the regional transit budget

Ridership:

In July Pace's system carried just more than 2 million rides, which represents an increase of 5.4% over 2024

August just more than 2.1 million rider, and that's 4.8% increase over 2024. The total this past August represented our second highest system ridership in the past year!

In September Pace's system carried 2.2 Millions riders for the month. This represents 7.4 over 2024 levels. This is the new highest ridership month this calendar year and the 2nd highest since January 2024.

In October Pace's system carried 2.17 million riders, which represents 71% of our 2019 ridership levels through October 2025. 73.4%

So far through all of 2025 Pace has provided 20.3 million rides. This represents a 5.1% increase year of year. That brings us to about 73.4% when compared to 2019 ridership levels.

These 2025 ridership stats continue to reflect how Pace's investments in frequency and targeted system enhancements are bringing back more riders into the system.

Pace Statements on the Passage of Illinois SB 2111:

With this new investment, we are poised to deliver more service, increased frequency, expanded bus-on-shoulder operations, new bus rapid transit corridors, and innovative solutions to meet growing demand," said Pace Executive Director Melinda Metzger. "This is a bold new chapter for Pace and for transit across northeastern Illinois. We are ready to build on our momentum and make our riders and communities proud."

Rideshare Access Program Update:

The following changes to the Rideshare Access Program (RAP) are in effect as of October 1, 2025:

- Increasing the RAP trip fare to \$3.25 per trip (to equal the ADA Paratransit fare)
- Capping the number of RAP rides to 30 per month per rider
- Free rides on CTA and Metra services for ADA-certified riders. Please note: Pace already offers <u>free rides on fixed route</u> to those customers.

These changes were necessary to comply with RTA's ADA Paratransit Action Plan. Furthermore, nothing is changing with traditional ADA Paratransit service at this time; the fare on that service is still \$3.25 per ride and eligible riders may take as many ADA Paratransit trips as they wish.

Metra OKs 2026 budget of \$1.2 billion; Includes new state funding, no fare increase

CHICAGO (Nov. 13, 2025) - The Metra Board of Directors today approved a \$1.2 billion operating budget for 2026 that relies on new state funding and requires no fare increases or service cuts. It also approved a \$515.3 million capital plan that continues major investment in bridges, stations, and new and rehabilitated rolling stock.

After Metra introduced its 2026 budget in October, the Illinois Legislature approved reforms and significant new funding for public transportation in northeast Illinois. The legislation was prompted by the pending exhaustion of federal COVID-relief funding that Metra and other transit agencies have been using to balance budgets since the COVID-19 pandemic. Metra expects its COVID funding to run out in the fourth quarter of next year.

The new funding allowed Metra to revise its budget to eliminate a proposed fare increase and fund modest service increases while still covering an expected \$27.9 million shortfall. The revised budget also eliminates a planned \$60 million transfer from the operating budget to its capital plan.

The \$1.2 billion budget includes \$55 million for costs related to a Northern Indiana Commuter Transportation District (NICTD) construction project that expands capacity on the Metra Electric Line, which is being reimbursed by NICTD. Excluding that cost, the budget for operations is about \$50 million higher than the 2025 budget. The increase is due to expected inflationary, contractual, and market increases; modest service increases; successful filling of vacancies; and higher costs related to UP and BNSF service.

The budget is funded by system-generated revenue of \$305.1 million, including \$187.9 million in fares. It also is funded by \$635.9 million in regional sales tax receipts, Metra's remaining \$206.1 million in federal COVID-relief funding, and \$27.9 million in new funding.

The \$515.3 capital program is funded by \$426.7 million in federal formula funding and discretionary grants, \$88.6 million in Illinois PAYGO funding, and \$100,000 in an RTA Access to Transit grant. The program allocates \$268.2 million to

rolling stock; \$68.5 million to bridges, tracks and structures; \$59.1 million in signals, electrical and communications; \$27.3 million in facilities and equipment; \$59.9 million in stations and parking; and \$32.3 million in support activities.

The budget now goes to the RTA for its final approval.

State lawmakers approve more than \$1 billion for transit; no service cuts, layoffs, or fare increases planned for 2026

The Illinois General Assembly passed landmark legislation on Friday, October 31, just before the close of the fall legislative session. Senate Bill 2111, which will be sent to the governor's desk and is expected to be signed into law, includes an estimated \$1.2 billion in new operating funding for the regional transit system. This sustainable funding will allow the system to not just avoid service cuts in 2026 and 2027, but to improve service for millions of riders in the coming years. On Thursday, November 6, 2025, the RTA Board of Directors approved an ordinance revising the estimated operating funds available to the system for 2026-28 and required recovery ratios for the Service Boards based on the revenue to be created under the bill.

RTA and the Service Boards are moving forward with no service cuts, no layoffs, and no fare increases in 2026. Instead, riders will see continued service improvements and upgrades to the rider experience.

The bill reorganizes the system under the Northern Illinois Transit Authority (NITA), with additional regional responsibilities and a Board of Directors that expands to 20 members with five to be appointed by the governor. NITA builds on the current responsibilities of the RTA with the authority for setting fares and conducting service and capital planning, allowing the Service Boards to focus on delivering high-quality service. Operating funding is distributed to CTA, Metra, and Pace using a new formula that includes key metrics from the National Transit Database and soon-to-be-developed service standards that will help guide appropriate levels of service for different communities.

The legislation has an effective date of June 1, 2026, with some of the new revenue streams not taking effect until July 1, 2026. The terms of current RTA Board members expire on September 1, 2026, while new NITA board members must be appointed within 120 days of the effective date. The current RTA board must vote to approve the 0.25% increase in the RTA Sales Tax via simple majority within 60 days of June 1, 2026. The legislation requires no fare increases for the first year of implementation and \$46.9 million in efficiencies for the 2026 budget

Regional transit budget hearings scheduled, final vote to occur in December

Each year, the RTA reviews, adopts, and monitors the annual operating budgets and five-year capital programs of the CTA, Metra, and Pace. The 2026 Regional Transit Operating Budget and Capital Program will be available for public comment online November 14 through December 5, 2025. RTA staff will present the regional budget in each county and accept comments through a virtual public hearing to be held via Zoom from 4-6 p.m. on Thursday, December 4. RTA staff will be made available following each of the hearings for members of the public to provide feedback.

CMAP news

2026 Regional Transportation Plan: refined financial forecasts and project evaluations

CMAP continues to advance the <u>2026 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP)</u> through extensive research, data analysis, and public engagement.

To meet federal requirements for fiscal constraint, CMAP is developing long-range financial forecasts for the RTP to estimate baseline revenues and expenditures and identify additional reasonably expected revenues. Working with a <u>financial plan resource group</u>, CMAP has refined transparent and accurate forecasting methods to guide investment priorities through 2050. A forthcoming **Financial Plan Risk Assessment** will evaluate key uncertainties and identify realistic and resilient mitigation strategies.

Through coordination with partner agencies, CMAP has identified 137 regional capital projects (RCPs) for possible inclusion in the RTP. A <u>draft RCP Benefits Report</u> summarizing the benefits that each proposed project offers to the region is now available. The RCP candidates can also be viewed in an <u>interactive</u> map. CMAP will continue to update and refine this report through the end of the year.

CMAP begins regional freight assessment with release of The Freight Landscape

CMAP is undertaking a <u>four-part assessment of the region's freight system</u> — including the trucks, ships, planes, railroads, and delivery vans we see every day. The assessment will introduce "goods movement" as a key topic of concern for the region's economy, environment, and highway performance, including traffic safety. CMAP has released the assessment's first report, <u>The Freight Landscape</u>, to provide key introductory facts about the region's freight system and to explain fundamental freight concepts.

The <u>STP Project Selection Committee</u> last met on November 6, 2025. 2024 IDOT National Highway System (NHS) pavement and bridge data

IDOT collects condition data on Interstate pavements annually and on non-Interstate pavements on a two-year cycle. Bridges receive a routine visual inspection at least every 2-4 years, depending on the condition. The results of the most recent NHS pavement condition assessments and bridge inspections, along with performance measures and targets, may be accessed on IDOT's "Performance" webpage.

2024 IDOT crash data

On August 11, 2025, IDOT released <u>Circular Letter 2025-11</u> announcing the availability of the 2024 crash data. This data set provides important crash information required for the identification of areas of improvement, work on safety studies, and the analysis on the location and number of crashes. The VRUSA contains IDOT's efforts to help stakeholders identify programs and projects to address vulnerable road user safety through stakeholders' engagement and data analysis. It also outlines safety strategies based on the safe system approach with a profound consideration for equity principles. It is IDOT's

intention for this document to be an important tool for stakeholders to continue to address the needs of VRU's in their communities.

To assist in the use of the VRUSA for the planning of future projects that address the safety of VRUs, a <u>VRUSA Dashboard</u> has been created that allows the user to view the results of the VRUSA data analysis in a way that can be filtered to specific areas of the state.

Funding opportunities

Local calls for the Surface Transportation Program

Local calls for projects for the <u>Surface Transportation Program–Local (STP-L)</u> are now open from October to December. This program provides federal funds for local transportation improvements, helping communities invest in projects that support safety, mobility, and regional priorities.

Each subregional Council of Mayors — along with the City of Chicago — administers its own STP-L program using locally established methodologies that align with regional planning goals. Interested communities are encouraged to contact their planning liaison through their respective <u>Council of Mayors</u> to learn more about eligibility, timelines, and application requirements.

The Village of Cary is in the process of completing final contract plans for the Frist Street resurfacing project from US 14 to Three Oaks Road currently targeted for the January 16, 2026, IDOT Letting. Surface Transportation Program Funds in the amount of \$1,317,500 (\$1,054,000 Federal Share) have been appropriated for the subject project in the FY2025 MCCOM Program.

At this time, the Village would like to request that the MCCOM increase the amount of funding for the project to cover 80% of the cost of the Construction and Construction Engineering costs. This would increase the Surface Transportation Program Funds to \$1,575,000 (\$1,260,400 Federal Share).

Reasons for cost increase are related to:

- 1. Annual construction cost inflation adjustment increases since the project originally let in January 2025 and not awarded.
- Construction adjacent to schools which restricts the timeframe of construction and increases project costs.
- 3. Engineering to update the plan set for 2026 IDOT letting specifications.

6.B Include Phase 1 Reconstruction in Engineering Targets

Currently the language in the methodology only allows for Phase 1 resurfacing projects to be eligible for funding. Recommend opening that up to both Phase 1 resurfacing and reconstruction projects.

6.C Adjusting STP Scoring

Under the agreement with CMAP for STP funding, 25% of the points in the application must be allocated to "planning." After the initial safety redesign, resurfacing fell below this threshold to only 23% of the application. To fix that, Safety percentage has been decreased from 10 to 8 points, and Complete Streets has been increased from 12 to 14. The only change is the weight of the points, there are no changes to the application.

7. A STP Mark

McHenry's FY26 mark is \$5,285,018. With Kreutzer going to let in January, the County's mark will be used up. Currently, the Redistribution fund is around \$120 million. During talks with CMAP, there has never been a year where the Redistribution fund has decreased by that amount. Funding is secured for STP projects.
